No Ordinary Man

Nicholas was a man of God who worked tirelessly for his flock. He gave to those in need and comforted the distraught. The legend describes St. Nicholas, giving away three sacks of gold to unfortunate families. People began to tell stories about a bishop and his power to change people's hearts. Because of all the good deeds Nicholas did, there were many stories of a man who could accomplish things no ordinary person could.

"It is easier to count the waves of the sea, the drops of rain, the stars, and with a glance see all the Atlantic, than to recount in detail God's marvels accomplished through Saint Nicholas," an eighth-century hymn proclaimed.

Nicholas gradually became an international phenomenon in the Old World. By the end of the fifteenth century, more than 2,500 churches, monasteries, hospitals, schools, and works of art had been dedicated to him in Western Europe.

In America, of course, he transformed into the champion bringer of gifts. Those three bags of gold have become Santa's sack of toys.

Yes, Santa Claus (whose name comes from Sinterklass, the Dutch name for Saint Nicholas) is

sometimes overexposed and exploited. At his best, though, he stands for the virtues that Saint Nicholas championed:

generosity, selflessness, and largeness of spirit.

There is one essential truth in the stories of Nicholas and Santa Claus: the goodness of the gift offered with no expectation of anything in return. That spirit lives in any parent who with secret joy watches a wonder-struck child on Christmas morning. The legacy of Saint Nicholas has rippled across seventeen centuries, bringing messages of faith and joy. His is a story worth knowing, especially this time of year.


JOB CHANGE

School Council

St. Mary's School Council met on Nov. 26 at 5:30 P.M. Dr. Compagnone led with prayer.

Parent surveys focusing on the Catholicity of the school
• were conducted during Parent/Teacher Conferences.

There was an 85% return rate. Results were shared in the Nov. newsletter. Overall, the results were posi-

• tive. Religious formation, being a reason to enroll students, was ranked high.

In the spring, parents will take part in another survey based on AdvancEd standards. This survey will be given online. Teachers and students will also be taking part in a survey for AdvancEd accreditation.

At the Nov. teacher's local in-service, STREAM (Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts, Math) was discussed. Teachers are in the process of aligning the Religion portion in the curriculum for next year. A few

teachers have indicated they are interested in teaching summer academies during the first two weeks of June. A parent interest survey will be sent home.

Jodee Blanco, was present on campus Nov. 15 & 16. She spoke to students during the day on the 15th and parents that evening. On the 16th she spoke with teacher at the diocesan institute. Her emphasis was on the emotional/social aspects that can be strengthened in the curriculum.

Grants: A grant is currently being written for tools and supplies in the greenhouse.

E-Rate is a federal program that helps school's libraries and infrastructure. For example, this is how the

telephone system was updated. We received \$64,000 in this cycle and there is \$24,000 remaining. 60% is funded by

E-Rate and the school funds \$10,000. There are items being looked at such as a Virtual Server and updating Windows 7 to Windows 10 in the computer lab.

The diocese applies for E-Rate as a group and the

governing board of each school must approve the Salina

Diocese Children's Internet Protection Policy. The

handout was shared with the school council. The handout explains how inappropriate sites are blocked. Students can be suspended. Parents can opt out, but then students would not be able to use the computers.

A new PowerSchool App is now available to parents to get announcements on their phones, Information will be sent home to the families.

The next school council meeting is Jan. 28.

Advent Project

Each year St. Mary's Grade School participates in a service project during the Advent Season. This year students are asked to bring quarters. Classrooms will have a tube for students to deposit their quarters. Than the tubes will be emptied into a larger jar. The money will be given to "Feed My Starving Children" campaign to help pay for manna rice packets.



E – Extend love. An effective way to experience love at the holidays is to

give it. Act with love, especially when dealing with family. Extending patience and kindness during the holiday season can be a challenge and a true act of love. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son ..." (John 3:16).



Why do Catholics refer to the family the "domestic church"?
