

The History of St. Mary'sGrade School

The history of St. Mary's Parish began in 1954 with the acquisition of 29 acres of land in southeast Salina at a cost of \$35,000. A Real Estate Committee, which was appointed by Msgr. John A Duskie, of the Sacred Heart Cathedral, selected the John Vanier property on East Cloud Street as a suitable site for Catholic School expansion. The members of this committee were E.R. Dandurand, Adolph Mentgen, Joe Easterday, Dr. Max Lake, and Frank Barbee. This location was authorized by Bishop Frank A Thill with an immediate goal...The erection of the first unit of St. Mary's Grade School.

The school was built at a cost of \$225,000 and was opened in the fall of 1955 with 225 students, 5 classrooms, and 5 teachers. Sister Myra Joseph was the first Principal of the grade school. The other teachers who were first to teach at St.



Mary's were the following: Sister M. Claude, Sister Charles Marie, Sister Stella Marie, and Mrs. Ellen Davis. Students in grades first through sixth were enrolled, and students in grades seventh and eighth were enrolled at the Sacred Heart Cathedral Grade School.

The Bishop's Educational and Development Campaign for the development and expansion of our Salina Catholic educational system was launched in the fall of 1958. The combined efforts of the Catholic people of Salina were directed to the common burden, and the initial campaign was a real success. Pledges totaling more than \$500,000 were submitted. As was promised during the campaign, steps were immediately undertaken to expand St. Mary's Grade School, and in the summer of 1959 four additional classrooms were added at the cost of \$63,000. J.S. Frank Construction Company built both units of the grade school.

ST. MARY'S ENDOWMENT FUND

In 1986 an educational endowment was set up for St. Mary's School. The purpose of St. Mary's Grade School Endowment Fund is to invest funds in which the proceeds of those investments go to support the ministry of St. Mary's School. Funds are invested with financial institutions. Today the total amount of funds invested is close to \$1.1 million. A separate endowment advisory board oversees the investment and recommends disbursements. Information about the endowment will be sent out later this month.

What Are the Primary Reasons Parents Enroll at St. Mary's Grade School?

Academic Excellence

A Catholic education can provide students with a solid academic foundation. Students study mathematics, social studies, English, science, foreign language, art, and religion. In the Cognia survey, 98% of parents at SMGS agreed with this statement; "the school provides a good balance between academics and religious teaching and the staff responds to the needs of my child(ren)". Parents view staff as partners in the education of their child(ren), (99%). The staff responds to the needs of my children (98%).

According to research, students who consistently attend school do best academically. St. Mary's Grade School has a 97% average daily attendance, according to the Kansas State Department of Education.

Catholic Faith and Values

Catholic education teaches students core values to help them mature into Christ-like people. Students learn self-discipline, how to accept responsibility for their actions, and how to make good decisions based on the tenets of their faith. They also learn about commitment, respect of others, and service. According to the parent survey, 94% of the respondents agreed with the statement that children are learning a need for community service, while 95% agree the gospel message is evident in all areas of learning.

Healthy Social Relationships and a Sense of Community

When children go to a Catholic school, they develop a strong bond with their fellow students, their school, their church, and their home to create a strong sense of community. An overwhelming number of parents (98%) agreed with the statement that a good community spirit exists within the school. At St. Mary's School children treat each other respectfully (95%).



Jesus showed his authority again when he performed an exorcism on the man. The unclean spirits had no

God's power and love are greater than any evil. Teach children that they can talk to Jesus about anything that happens, good or bad. At the same time, stress that Jesus is God and deserves to be worshipped and obeyed.

Assessment Program at St. Mary's School

St. Mary's Grade School follows a traditional curriculum. The basic core subjects of Religion, Math, and Language Arts are integrated with Science, Social Studies, and Data Analysis.

In today's educational conversations, there is a great emphasis on "academic growth" and preparing students for the next level.

For over 40 years, St. Mary's Grade School has been committed to monitoring academic growth in Grades K-6. Data collected from assessments are for both short and long term academic progress of individual students. The staff utilizes several tools to observe and analyze student advancement.

ACRE (Assessment of Catholic Religious Education) helps schools evaluate faith, knowledge, and attitudes of Catholic School students. This is administered in the 5th, 8th, and 11th grades.

Acadience Reading which is individually administered, measures acquisition of early literacy skills in K-6. Acadience Math is a brief evaluation of numeracy, computation, and problem solving skills in K-6. These two assessments are done three times a year.

ITBS (Iowa Tests of Basic Skills) is a national standardized assessment and is more comprehensive across the curriculum including Phonics, Reading, Math, Language (Spelling/Capitalization/Punctuation), Science (Life and Physical), and Social Studies (History, Economics and Civics). Results of the ITBS are shared with parents at mid-year conferences. At the same time, individual student's academic growth from year to year is also reviewed and shared. Starting in 2017, The ITBS will also provide predictive scores for ACT starting in Grade 6.

Kansas Assessments are summative assessments used to measure student knowledge based on the Kansas College Standards. Summative assessments are given towards the end of the year and can aid in reviewing curriculum and infrastructure.
