Plant and grow flowers, fruits and vegetables with your family. Creating a garden is tough work and a good way to stay fit.


Commitment Forms

Commitment Forms were mailed out to families on March 3rd. Please make sure you are current with tuition, Extended Care and Love N Learn. You also need to have all you paperwork for the school nurse turned in. These forms will be due back to the school office on Monday, April 3. Forms will be date stamped. A \$100 commitment fee is also due back with these forms.



90-95% of brain growth happens in the first 5 years.

The brain develops from back to front and from the inside out.



Survival Center - (brainstem) This area is fully developed at birth and handles basic instincts and functions to sustain life and movement.

Emotional Center - (Mid-brain) The developmental focus is during ages 0-5. This area is the center of our emotions and the focus of development in the early childhood years. Toddlers and preschoolers are operating primarily from the limbic system or the emotional brain.

Executive Center - (prefrontal cortex) This is the last area to be established and development continues through the mid-20s. There are developmental spurts at approximately ages 5-6; 11-12; and around 15. Children, at different stages, have varying levels of access to the executive functions of the brain. Without the time to amass an array of emotional and physical experiences, their brains cannot always successfully predict, plan or react properly hence they may fail to act responsibly.

Child development unfolds uniquely for each child. Self-regulation and socially acceptable behaviors take time to develop.

Library Lane

Hello again everyone! Library Lane is as busy as ever and we are currently doing a bit of reorganizing to try and help out with the traffic flow. As I have been able to see more of the needs of our students and learned from other successful school librarians, I have started shifting items to more user-friendly spaces. Displays! One of the many advantages of having Mr. Platt in the classroom and library with me is that he is able to do some great work curating our displays and keeping the library fresh and presentable for our students. Each month, he has been swapping out our featured items, so it was a goal of mine to lay out our furniture a little better to help bring them to the forefront. Students are still encouraged to take items from the displays! One of the main reasons that I like putting books in a more prominent place is to shed some light on some of our often overlooked gems that we have here within our shelves. The "Mr. Swenson Selects…" display is also fun. Five ways to prepare for Easter joy

Lent is an opportunity to strengthen our family's spiritual life. We start by examining where we are and who we want to become as a family.

Recommitment: Resolve to live as a gospel-centered family and recommit to the Ten
Commandments.
Encourage reverence for God, modesty and respect for others, integrity in work, gratitude, and respect for others'

possessions.

Reconciliation: Jesus said we should reconcile with our brother before coming to worship (Matthew 5:23:24). Commit to frequent Confession and make it a family practice to make amends and to repair relationships with anyone wronged.

Worship: Give your family the powerful grace of the Eucharist. Attend Mass together and encourage prayer and participation from children. Teach them the prayers and the most common hymns sung at your parish. Cue them when to sit, stand, and

> kneel. Whisper together, "I love you, Jesus," at the elevation of the Body and Blood.

Togetherness: Shared time is an

opportunity to share values and faith. When parents invest time – like family meals – to share their faith, children understand that

faith is important.
